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Isolated blunt traumatic injury to the submandibular gland is very rare. In the previous case reports, most patients with isolated submandibular gland injury had a good prognosis without any major complication. We report here a case of deep neck infection due to traumatic isolated submandibular gland fracture with computed tomography findings.

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The first case was reported in 2008 with corresponding features on intra-oral images and panoramic views.9 Ano-ther case report discussed a patient who was treated for rheumatoid arthritis by an acupuncturist with gold-thread acupuncture.2 The radiographic images showed findings similar to those of the previously described case.
