Elements of a Unit Plan. A unit plan overarches all daily lesson plans with connections among key topics, concepts, skills, and desired outcomes. All the following elements should be considered when developing a unit plan: A principal purpose; Main topic or topics (e.g., World War II, reptiles, double-digit multiplication)
