Introduction - Set out the "Crux" of the Paper. Introduce and note why the topic is important. Briefly summarize necessary background information. State your thesis. Convey your organization of the paper -- (i.e., "roadmap"). Tell the audience what your paper will show and in what order. If you can concisely summarize your research and outline the arguments of your paper, then odds your audience will be able to follow your analysis.

Length and Formatting. Resumes for law school should be a maximum of one to two pages in length. According to Stanford Law's admissions site, "Stanford requires a one-to-two page resume describing your academic, extracurricular and professional activities." The University of Chicago Law's admissions team offers a bit more leeway, stating, "You can go into more detail than you would in a typical resume for employment (use your judgment though; very rarely does one need more than 2-3 pages)."
